GENERAL DESCRIPTION: This course will help the participants understand the origins, development and governance of the FMC.

I. COURSE OBJECTIVES: Upon satisfactory completion of the course participants will be able to:

- A.** Display a working knowledge of church history leading to the development of the Free Methodist Church, including:
 - Identification of the historical and theological developments that set the stage for the Wesleyan Movement
 - Identification of the key events of John Wesley's life and ministry
 - Identification of key events leading to the birth and development of the FMC
- B.** Display a working knowledge of the ***Book of Discipline*** of the Free Methodist Church, including:
 - Identification and explanation of the Articles of Religion
 - Explanation of the polity and organization of the Free Methodist Church
 - Identification of the distinct characteristics of the Free Methodist Church
- C.** Personally integrate the history and polity of the Free Methodist Church into his / her ministry context.

B. Course Assignments

1. Submit a reflection paper on your call to ministry and what it means to you to live out that call as part of the Free Methodist Church. This should be emailed to the instructor by Friday, October 25. You will be asked to share this during the Zoom Video Conference on Saturday October 26 to help the group get to know one another.
2. Complete the following three online assignments:
 - a. Post a reflection on your reading of John Wesley's Class Meeting by midnight on Wednesday October 30. By midnight Friday November 1 share observations on at least three of your fellow classmates' posts.  - b. Post a reflection on your reading of B.T. and Ellen Roberts and the First Free Methodists by midnight on Wednesday November 6.  - c. Post a reflection based on your reading of the first three chapters of the 2015 Free Methodist Book of Discipline by midnight on Wednesday November 13. By midnight Thursday November 14 share observations on at least three of your fellow classmates' posts. 3. **Project:** The student will have the option of choosing between the following final projects. These projects are due to the instructor one month following the end of class. You can submit them in hard copy or as data files. Make sure that you keep a copy of your project as you will only receive a feedback sheet.
 - a. Develop a membership class for use in the local church. You will need to select a target age audience for the class (children, youth, adult). The project should include a copy of the class outline/teaching notes, student handouts and a copy of multi-media materials produced for the class., **The project should be such that it could be given to someone to teach the class.**
 - b. Develop a small group curriculum on the Free Methodist Church. While similar to a membership class the focus of this material would not be to invite into membership, It could be that persons who have been members of your church for many years would take the class. (Sometimes recent members have a greater understanding of the FMC than it's older members.) The project should include a copy of the class outline/teaching notes, student handouts and a copy of multi-media materials produced for the class., **The project should be such that it could be given to someone to teach the class.**
 - c. Develop a small group curriculum based on an aspect of our historical distinctives. This project could focus on the "branding" of the Free Methodist Church for the 21st century based on it's DNA from the 19th century. The project should include a copy of the class outline/teaching notes, student handouts and a copy of multi-media materials produced for the class., **The project should be such that it could be given to someone to teach the class.**

IV. Course Grade:

1. The final grade for the course will be determined by the points earned in the completion of the following assignments:
 - Class attendance & discussion 20 Points (class sessions are required)
 - Pre-class reflection paper 10
 - Three online reflection & feedback 30 Points (10 points each)
 - Final Project 40 Points
 - 100 Points
